This next week, we have two special holy days that we celebrate in our church. On Wednesday, November 1, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of All Saints.

THIS IS A HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION AND AS A CATHOLIC YOU ARE OBLIGATED TO ATTEND MASS.

Mass at St. Francis Church will be held at 8:30 am, with our parish school students in attendance, or at 7:00 pm. Both liturgies will be held in the main church. There is a collection.

On Thursday, November 2, we celebrate the Solemnity of All the Faithful Departed. While this is not a Holy Day of Obligation, I would highly recommend coming together with our parish family to remember those that have passed on from this life, to our hoped for eternal life with God in heaven. In particular at this Holy Sacrifice of the Mass we will remember those that have died from our own St. Francis Church since last November 2nd.

Also, during the month of November, it is customary for us to place the names of our beloved faithful departed upon our altar during all the masses. Please take advantage of the offering envelope for All Souls Day to write down the names of those you would like remembered at all the Masses during November. If you do not have offertory envelopes, you may simply write the names of your beloved dead on a white envelope with your offering and place them in the collection basket. The monies collected are used for the General Fund.

Another tradition that many Catholics observe during the month of November is paying a visit to the local cemetery and saying a pray for the dead. While, ideally we should pay a visit to the cemetery were our family members and friends have been laid to rest, sometimes distance prevents us from visiting those specific locations. Therefore, I would propose that any cemetery would be suitable or even your own home. Following is a prayer example. There are many, many others to be found...

Lord God,
whose days are without end
and whose mercies beyond counting,
keep us mindful
that life is short and the hour of death unknown.
Let your Spirit guide our days on earth
in the ways of holiness and justice,
